
<u>Understanding</u> <u>Book Bits</u>



Cover Matter

Objectives:

Identify the parts of a book. Recognize what makes a title distinct on a book. Identify where to find the author of a book. Identify what an illustrator or photographer is and where to find the information on the book.

Method:

Go over the parts that make up a cover of a book and list them on the board for students. Point out each part to the students. Discuss why we need all this information in the cover (helps in selection of book and checking that it is a subject we want or are studying). Look at covers of a variety of non- fiction and fiction books. Go over the checklist with each book and check off the parts you find on each cover. Have the students make a copy of a cover of a book from the classroom or library. Go over the checklist for with the students to make sure they have the materials needed on their cover.




The Cover of a Book

A book cover is the first thing you see when you look at a book. It can tell you a lot about a book. But it also keeps the inside pages safe from tearing or getting dirty.

The Title

Objectives: Recognize where to find the title of a book. Identify what the title of a book tells us.

Method:

Brainstorm with students some of the titles of books that they know and talk about what the title tells us about the book. Talk about the title as our first prediction point for the book. Give students some teacher/given titles and have them predict what they think the book might be about. For older children in Div 2 we want to also discuss the copy-write page and what that tells us about the age and the publisher of the book. Young children can be introduced if ready, but not necessary for Div 1. There are worksheets provided with this lesson for different skill levels. You may use them as individual work or as small group work based on your classroom.




One of the first pages inside a book is called the title page. The title page tells us the title of the book and the author.




The Author and the Illustrator

<u>Objectives:</u> Identify what the author and illustrator do for a story. Identify where to find that information in the book.


Method: Look at a variety of books from the classroom and go over the pictures on the front and back and look at the size of the book (number of pages). Go over the author and illustrators names and talk about what they did for the story. Predict why the author may have chosen to write this story. Why did he want to write about this subject? Look at the front of the book point out that the author and illustrator are usually at the bottom or near the bottom of the book and are in smaller print then the title. Included with this lesson are worksheets to help reinforce the concepts. There is a high and low level worksheet included. These can be done individually or as a small group assignment based on your class.


An Author's Name





The Table of Contents

<u>Objectives:</u> Identify the parts of the table of contents. Identify what the table of contents tells us. Recognize how to use the table of contents in a book.

Method: On the board with the students go over the parts of a table of contents. (Use one from a book you have just read or are going to read to them. Point out the page numbers and the headings beside each page number. Talk about books being divided into parts or a section based on what the author is writing about. The Table of Contents is used to guide your reading and also to direct you to a specific part of the book you might need. From the demo on the board, have the students come up with a possible title for the book based on the headings. Go over each heading and discuss what the author might say about each heading. Ask students where you may look to find specific info in a book. There are a variety of worksheets included with this lesson that can be done individually or in small group settings. There are both high and low worksheets for a variety of levels.

USING THE PARTS OF A BOOK

A content book or a book of information has many parts. The title page of a book has the information about when and where the book was published. It will give you the name of the author. It will tell you the copyright date or the date the book was written or published.

The table of contents in a book will help you to find the names of the chapters of the book and the page number where each chapter begins. Each chapter of the book will have a name and usually has a chapter number.

The glossary of a book will give meanings to words used in the book. Vocabulary words or new words in the book will be here. The glossary can help you to understand your reading and will make it easier for you to learn and study the information.

The index of a book is very valuable to learners. You will find a listing of each topic in the book, names of people, maps in the book, or any other information in the book listed here. This listing will be in alphabetical order and will have the page number in the book where you can find the information you are looking for. This is very helpful to learners.

Take a few minutes to review a book and see if you can find all the parts of a book. Locating information can be easy and fun.
